# Fifty Eighth Annual Report 2006-2007

#### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The AGM took place on Tuesday19 June at Lion Walk Church, under the chairmanship of Andrew Phillips, in the absence of the Mayor of Colchester.

Audited Accounts for the year were presented and approved and are featured on pages 4 and 5.

Among the business discussed, Mrs Jane Rees was elected to the Committee and the merger between the Museum Services of Colchester and Ipswich was reported, with both Friends organizations remaining as autonomous societies, albeit with liaison between the two.

Following the business part of the evening, FRANK GRACE gave a lecture entitled *Rags and Bones*, which focused on life in the Dockland Slums of Ipswich.

#### SUBSCRIPTIONS

Subscriptions for 2007 became due on 1st January – single  $\pounds$ 7.50, couple  $\pounds$ 12, and family  $\pounds$ 18.

#### GIFT AID

You may be surprised to learn that we have raised  $\pounds 6,290$  from Gift Aid claimed on annual subscriptions since the scheme started in 2000. The first year that we claimed the Inland Revenue sent us  $\pounds 409$ , and we will soon receive almost  $\pounds 1,500$  for the year ended 31 March 2007. Most members have signed up for the scheme and it is hoped that more will do so in the future. Once you have signed a

Gift Aid form, you have no need to complete any other forms – and we can backdate claims to cover any contributions made since 2000 or the date that you joined.

To sign the form, you do need to be a UK tax payer, but apart from that, there are no other qualifications. The Friends hold your authority and can use this to claim back Gift Aid on all contributions on subscriptions. If you make donations at any time, we can claim on those as well. Many thanks.

# Museum News

It has been a busy couple of months since the merger with Ipswich. We are now the Colchester and Ipswich Museum Service and are all working hard to combine the wealth of museums, collections and experience into a coherent force. The cross-border links are throwing up some interesting opportunities, particularly so in that 'Constable Country' falls squarely within the museum collecting area. On which subject the museum in Colchester have some exciting news to report.

On 18 May the museum received a visit from Anne Lyles, the Curator of the Constable

Collection at Tate Britain, as part of preliminary research for an exhibition of portraits by John Constable to be held in April 2009 at the National Portrait Gallery in London. The museum has a portrait by Constable of Thomas Letchmere Grimwood, Headmaster of Dedham Grammar School where he studied.

There is also a portrait of John Constable's mother Ann, the attribution of which has been in some doubt for a number of years. This painting was thought to be a copy by another artist of the original Constable portrait in the collection at Tate Britain. However, Anne Lyles, having viewed the painting, is convinced that the Colchester portrait is the original, painted in about 1805 and the Tate portrait a copy painted about 10 years later.

Strangely the Tate copy, although almost identical in all other respects, has Ann Constable facing right rather than left as in the original portrait. This a strong clue as to the reason why it was painted. It was probably commissioned as a pair to an existing portrait of her husband, Golding Constable, in which he was facing left. So the copy of Ann Constable was painted in reverse to make the two portraits face each other – quite an achievement in its own right!.

If you want to see the original Constable portrait of Ann Constable for yourself, (pictured in black and white below), you will find it on display in Colchester Castle Museum. TOM HODGSON

#### A MAJOR NEW MUSEUM PUBLICATION

On 2 August there was an evening reception at the Castle Museum to celebrate the publication of a book entitled *A Late Iron Age Warrior Burial from Kelvedon, Essex* by museum archaeologist DR PAUL SEALEY. Nearly two hundred guests assembled in the vicinity of the Charles Gray Room, many of them Friends of the Museum. There was a display of finds from the grave and also on view was the



magnificent oil painting depicting the world of the Kelvedon warrior by Peter Froste that featured on the front cover of the book. Peter himself was present at the launch.

So too were the sons of the man who excavated the grave, Paul and Bob Bennett. This summer Paul and Bob very generously donated the finds from the grave to the museum; the grave is a find of national importance and the museum service was understandably delighted and excited with their contribution

The warrior himself was an elite fighter who died c.75-25 BC and was laid to rest on a hillside overlooking Kelvedon village. He was buried with a sword, spear and shield; other grave goods included a bronze bowl imported from the Roman world and an elegant native tankard with a bronze handle.

#### **3 November –** Colchester Past: Horse-drawn Carriages, Trams and Cars PATRICK DENNEY

Up to the First World War, the roadways were the domain of the horse. At the turn of the 20th century, the number of horses on the nation's roads had exceeded three million. However, major changes were afoot – within a decade or so horse transport was in serious decline. In its place came electric trams, cars and a revolution in personal travel.

# **10 November –** *The Prittlewell Prince* Ken Crowe

In 2003, as part of an archaeological evaluation following proposals to widen a road in Prittlewell, an astonished project team found the most important Saxon burial since Sutton Hoo. An almost perfectly intact princely burial dating back to the early 7th century amazed the archaeological world. Ken Crowe, Keeper of Human History at Southend Museums, describes the circumstances of the discovery, the finds and its significance.

#### **17 November -** *Mushrooms and Toadstools, Edible and Otherwise* IAN ROSE

Drawing upon a lifetime of natural history study and photography, fungus 'fun guy' Ian Rose gives an illustrated talk on the fungus around us. Find out which ones are to be admired from afar, and which ones you can take home for a hearty meal. See toadstools and mushrooms in a new light!

# **24 November –** *The Roman Circus in Colchester* PHILIP CRUMMY

The important discovery of the Roman Circus in Colchester meant the town's history had to be re-written! Recent excavations show the circus was over a quarter of a mile long accommodating about 15,000 spectators. Teams of four-horse chariots would run around the track seven times in races of about two and half miles. Philip Crummy describes how it was discovered, what it looked like, and how it was to spend a day at the races 1800 years ago!

### **1 December -** *A Portrait of the Artist as a Disabled Man: John Vine, 1807-1867* Dr Jane Pearson

This talk examines the significance of John Vine's life as it reveals past attitudes to disability, how disability affected his life, his work and his family. John Vine was born with rudimentary arms and imperfect hands and of diminutive stature. Nevertheless, he showed a talent for drawing as a child and earned money as a 'freak child' prodigy in fairs and shows. Using brushes with long handles held in his fingers, he settled in Colchester painting prize winning animals.
