Sixty Seventh Annual Report 2015-2016

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting took place on Tuesday 21st June at Lion Walk Church, with the Mayor of Colchester, Councillor Julie Young in the chair. The meeting was followed by Will Tyler's lecture entitled *The First Day of the Somme*.

FROM THE CHAIRMAN

At the Friends' Annual General Meeting, held on Tuesday 21st June 2016, the usual reports were made about the Society's recent activities and achievements. Of special interest are several important acquisitions. These include two items of treasure arising from the Portable Antiquities Scheme – a medieval gold finger ring and a later medieval silver 'vervel' or hawking ring – for whose retention we provided £400 and £450 respectively. Both of these rings are local finds which will help to embellish the collections.

There is also a fine red leather-bound book of photographs by William Gill of Colchester scenes entitled *Colchester Illustrated* which was compiled and published privately with his own personal comments by Alderman Wilson Marriage. It was discovered in a Norwich

bookshop by our eagle-eyed Treasurer and purchased for £150. At the end of the meeting this book and the following items were formally presented to the Mayor, Cllr. Julie Young, and members were able to inspect them afterwards.

Our latest acquisitions were generously bequeathed by the late Richard Cooper. They comprise two portraits of children by John Vine, the local artist, and items of memorabilia relating to the local Co-operative Society – namely, the presentation trowel and key from the opening of the Co-op premises in Long Wyre Street.

These various items illustrate just some of the different ways in which the Friends can help in ensuring that objects of local historical interest will be safeguarded for future generations. Bequests of suitable objects for collection or financial gifts of any amount are always welcome and help us to be ever ready in meeting our obligations.

Colchester's museums provide excellent activities and plenty of interest as reflected in the healthy visitor figures, which point strongly to the quality our local heritage and museums. However, with the Museum Resource Centre

facing imminent closure and a workable solution still to be found, the major concern for the future success of Colchester's Museum Service lies firmly with the will and ability of Colchester Borough Council to make adequate long-term provision for the all-important support services on which it all depends.

FROM THE MUSEUMS MANAGER

I was pleased to see such a good turnout at the Friends AGM, where I shared the good news that the Castle Museum continues to attract around 100,000 visits which is a rise of around 25% compared with the last year before the major refurbishment.

One of the highlights of the year was the launch of the Fenwick Treasure. This remarkable Colchester find makes a significant contribution to the story of the devastating Boudican revolt and adds a particularly human element to the narrative. It was also a good example of a strong partnership between business and heritage with the continued support and encouragement from the Fenwick Group and Mr Hugo Fenwick in particular.

Friends may have heard that the bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund to create a new collections centre in the St Botolph's development was not successful. Nevertheless the aspiration remains to make the Colchester collections more accessible to a wider range of people and we are pursuing other options.

Friends may have noticed that the events and activities in the museums have been supported by lively and enthusiastic trainees with the museum service. With funding from the Arts Council England, the trainees have given a real boost to the service and have broadened the appeal of our programme. invaluable support as both users of the museums, fundraisers and ambassadors for Colchester's outstanding heritage.

MEMBERSHIP UPDATE 2016

Our membership figures currently total 673 across all categories (July 2016). This represents a small decline in numbers from our 2015 total of 701, and indeed our 2014 figure of 716. The current breakdown compared with our 2015 figures are as follows:- Single 318 (335), Couples 232 (235), Family 112 (119) and other 11 (12). It can thus be seen that the greater loss in numbers is from our single members – 17 fewer than last year. However, the aggregate figure taken from across all membership

categories, still exceeds over 1,200 members, which is a healthy total taken as a whole.

The Committee and I would like to thank the membership for their continued support and hope to see you all at the commencement of our new lecture series in September 2016.

CASTLE NOTES

Last year turned out to be a record-breaker in terms of schools visits. Over the course of the year 20,600 schoolchildren came to the Castle, which is the highest figure in my 21 years at the museum.

We have added more content to the Castle app. There is now a 360 degree view of the prison as it would have appeared following its renovation in 1791. If you stand in the lunch area, the app will show you the prison building, yard and gaoler's house. See the gaoler's house on the right.

Following the great success of the launch of the Fenwick Treasure we have commissioned a jeweller, Nicky Wade, to produce copies of one of the gold bracelets and pendants and earrings based on the original designs. The bespoke jewellery is for sale in the museum shop.

RECENT ACQUISITION: A Viking Gold Finger-ring from Tendring District

The Friends recently agreed to make a contribution of £300 towards the acquisition of a Treasure case – an unusual Viking finger ring from Tendring District, east of Colchester. The ring consists of a lozenge-shaped sheet which has been drawn into wires at each end. The ends of the wires are hooked, showing that they would originally have been

twisted together, but the ring has been slightly flattened and the ends have sprung apart. The central area has a

'toothed' border, within which there are a series of triangles arranged in rows which have been formed by a punch. The ring measures 23.7mm in length, 10.4mm in width (max) and weighs 2.0g.

Viking gold finger rings with punched triangle decoration are less common than the other main type made of twisted or plaited wire. Similar gold rings are, however, known from Beachamwell (Norfolk) and Whorlton (North Yorkshire) whilst a silver version was found at Wood Enderby (Lincolnshire)in 2011. A number of related rings in non-precious metal are also known. All date to the Viking Age from the late 9th–10th century.

This period is poorly represented in the Colchester archaeology collection and as a complete and recognisable type of object this local find is particularly significant. It is also an attractive piece of jewellery which represents a popular design amongst Viking women or at least those who adopted Viking fashions.

Early this year, we were contacted by the executors of Richard Cooper, a local auctioneer and member of the Friends of Colchester Museums.


In his will
