Sixty-ninth Annual Report 2017 - 2018

FROM THE CHAIRMAN

On Tuesday 19 June 2018 we held our sixtyninth Annual General Meeting at Lion Walk Church with 47 members attending this part of the proceedings. After the formalities had been completed the numbers in attendance swelled to just under a hundred to hear an entertaining lecture from one of our Vice-Presidents, and former Chairman, Andrew Phillips.

This was the culmination of another successful lecture series which had begun back in September 2017. Over the past 12 meetings our speakers have entertained us with a wide range of subjects, with an average of 85 persons in attendance at each meeting. In addition to this our three new afternoon lectures attracted another 98 members and friends.

Plans are already in place for our 2018-19 lecture series which will begin with a talk on Tuesday 4 September entitled 'Essex Towns and Villages'. And, of course, this will also prove to be the 70th anniversary year since the formation of the Society in 1949.

UPDATE FROM COLCHESTER MUSEUMS

WE ARE COLCHESTER

The latest exhibition at Hollytrees Museum is "We Are Colchester". It explores the ways in which objects reflect a person's identity, whether through choice or unintentionally.

The stories of six Colchester residents are told through their personal items, whilst a selection of objects from the museum's collection are brought out to show how people have used objects to reflect their identity throughout the town's history.



Come along and add your own stories through our engagement wall, as we try to understand how diversity can be seen in the people of Colchester today.

This ground-breaking exhibition is expected to provoke thought and challenge visitor's assumptions about people's identity and social stereotypes. The exhibition is free to visit and runs until Saturday 5 January 2019.

COLCHESTER IN THE FIRST WORLD WAR

Colchester Castle is currently hosting an exhibition called "Colchester in the First World War".

On 4 August 1914 Britain declared war. Noone in Colchester could have grasped the impact this would have on their lives and their town. Over the next four years, the Army trained thousands of soldiers for war. At times there were as many soldiers at Colchester Garrison as civilians in the town.




Colchester was close to the front line. Evacuation plans were prepared in case the Germans invaded the Essex coast. The Borough also took precautions against the new threat of air raids. Men and boys went away to war, leaving behind jobs that were then filled by women. These included

agriculture, munitions and nursing which were essential to the war effort. Although households were encouraged to practice food economy, in the last year of the war rationing was introduced to ensure fair supplies for all.

The exhibition focuses on three themes: Colchester under attack; the war effort in the town: commemoration and remembrance.

The objects on display include: an evacuation card, issued to all Colchester households in May 1916, with instructions on what to do if the Germans invaded;



a fragment of the Zeppelin airship, L33, brought down near Colchester on the night of 24th Sept 1916; a high explosive shell made by Paxmans; and the souvenir booklet produced for the unveiling of the Colchester War Memorial in 1923.

The exhibition runs until Sunday 6 January 2019.

FAREWELL

Bill Seaman retired as Museums and Heritage Manager in August. He achieved much over six years, adding his touch to the redevelopment of Colchester Castle, in the form of the chariot ride and the light projection, and steering the museum service to achieve Arts Council funding and National Portfolio Organisation status for at least the next four years. Bill will be keeping himself busy with many different projects in Norfolk where he lives.

His successor will be Frank Hargrave. Frank currently lives in Chester and is the director for Norton Priory Museum and Gardens in Runcorn. As well as successfully running the venue Frank led a £4.5m redevelopment of it and comes with a solid museums background along with experience of driving up visitor numbers, income and opportunities working alongside a range of key partners. He's really excited about moving down to the Eastern Region and working with the museum team and partners such as yourselves.

Frank won't be joining us until mid-October so in the meantime I shall be the key contact overseeing things for Colchester Museums.

HERITAGE OPEN DAYS 2018

This year, for the first time, Heritage Open Days takes place over eight days from the 6th-9th September and 13th-16th September 2018. Over thirty historic properties across Colchester will be open including Colchester Castle on Saturday 8th September from 10am - 5pm (Last entry at 4.30pm). Other planned activities over the two weekends include accompanied guided walks, talks, tours and exhibitions.

Heritage Open Days is England's largest festival of history and culture which sees historic places country-wide throw open their doors to celebrate their individual heritage, community and history. It provides a great way to discover Colchester's fascinating history and see inside venues that are usually closed to the public, all for free.

This year two new properties are opening: the Lepra Museum in the Octagon Building, Middleborough and the Abbey Field Centre within the former Victorian garrison.

Lepra is a UK-based specialist leprosy charity, working to beat leprosy. The **Lepra Museum** documents the charity's 95-year history, featuring information, stunning photography and artefacts from their overseas work with people affected by leprosy throughout the 20th Century and up to the present day. You can learn about the lives of people affected, the cure which changed the face of leprosy treatment, and how, in 1996, Blue Peter viewers helped to build Lepra's Health and Research Centre in Hyderabad, India.

Built around 1862 as a gymnasium, the **Abbey Field Centre** is one of the earliest surviving military buildings from the Victorian garrison. It is a two-storey building designed to accommodate an entire regiment of between 1,000 and 1,500 men. The gymnasium has remained empty for some years, but following extensive repairs has recently been taken over by the Mercury Theatre as a rehearsal space and for community programmes.

COLCHESTER REMEMBERS

As part of Colchester Borough Council's commemoration of the end of the Great War in November 1918, Philip Wise from the Museum Service will be looking at the town's war memorials. These range from the well-known at Castle Park to less familiar examples from the town's historic buildings. The stories behind their creation will be explored and their designs considered in the context of the art styles of the time.

The talk accompanies the temporary exhibition 'Colchester in the First World War' currently on display at Colchester Castle. It will be given in the Castle's Charles Grey Room on 3 November at 3.00 pm. It is a free event, following admission to the Castle, but donations will be requested.

Ingatestone Hall by Peter Jones



Helicopter of the Queens Flight

The June outing this year was to Ingatestone Hall the family seat of the Petre family. Our entry to the house was briefly held up due to the departure of the Countess of Wessex who was on a visit to Essex. She departed in a helicopter of the Queen's flight from the field alongside our coach.

The house is a 16th century Grade I listed building that was built by Sir William Petre on land he purchased for £850 resulting from the Dissolution of the Monasteries and the house has been owned by the family ever since. Sir William, although of humble origins, became Secretary of State eventually serving four Tudor monarchs. Although a catholic sympathiser he managed to retain his position and his head through all the religious upheavals of the 16th century. Our party was divided into two groups with a guide who took us on a tour of the house pointing out the various additions and alterations to the house including two priest holes. The fitting conclusion to the tour was the Long Gallery that contained pictures and mementos and 400 years of Petre family history.

We then retired to the tearooms to enjoy tea and some wonderful cakes.



The Gatehouse, a Grade II listed building of brick and timber, topped by an unusual clock with only one hand and the family motto: "Sans Dieu Rien". Without God Nothing.

Landguard Fort by Peter Jones

Our second trip was to Landguard Fort located on the peninsular below Felixstowe. The purpose of the fortification was to guard the entrance to Harwich harbour, which for centuries, was Britain's most important east coast port. The fort has seen continual development over the years. Henry VIII built the first defences here in 1543. Future developments and improvements were usually being determined by the invasion threat at the time. There were major rebuilds in 1628 and 1666 and the fort saw action the following year, successfully repelling an invasion by 1,500 Dutch marines. Along with Harwich Redoubt it was part of the defences against the French in the Napoleonic wars. Substantially enlarged during the Victorian period it again saw service in both world wars, finally being vacated by the army in 1957.



Our party was divided into two groups each with a guide who took us on a trip through time showing us what the various rooms were used for and a selection of the defenders' weapons. One particularly impressive gun from the 1860s (see left) weighed 38 tons, and used 160lbs of gunpowder to fire an 812lb shell. It was crewed by 17 men, had a range of 2000 yards and could only manage one shot every 4 minutes. As someone in our group said "I wouldn't like to have been standing next to that when it went off!"

The guides were very knowledgeable and made the trip very interesting for us. After the tour we adjourned to a nearby café for a well-deserved lunch. There was a short period of time before departure and some members went into the Felixstowe Museum, next to the fort. This was well worth the effort, a surprising diverse collection of military, industrial and domestic items depicting the town's long history.



Hatfield House by Patrick Denney

On Wednesday 18 July 2018, around sixty Friends enjoyed a hot but most enjoyable day at Hatfield House in Hertfordshire. The original Palace of Hatfield, which still stands in part next to the present house, was the childhood home of Queen Elizabeth I and was apparently her



favourite residence.

The present Hatfield House was built in 1611 by Robert Cecil, First Earl of Salisbury, and has been the Cecil family home ever since. The interior of the house is magnificent with many of the rooms open to the public. The house is set within a large park which visitors are free to roam at will and explore some of the wonderful old trees, a few of which are believed to be well over a thousand years old.

History records that it was here on 17 November 1558 that the young princess Elizabeth was sitting under an oak tree reading from the book of Psalms when a messenger arrived from London to inform her that she had become Queen.

This life size statue of James I, which stands over the mantelpiece in the King James Drawing Room, was presented to the house by the king himself.
