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Annual Report 2020

FROM THE CHAIRMAN

As reported in our March 2020 mailing we regrettably had to cancel all of our planned activities for the summer months. This included outings to Stow Maries Airfield and the East Anglian Museum of Rural Life, as well as our entire programme of spring and summer lectures, which included our Annual General Meeting which should have taken place on 16th June 2020.

We said at the time that we hoped to be able to continue with our autumn 2020 programme as planned on 8th September – which would also have included our delayed Annual General Meeting. However as I'm sure you are all aware, continuing Coronavirus restrictions mean that resuming our normal activities in the near future appear to be extremely unlikely and for that reason your committee has taken the decision to cancel all future meetings until further notice, which in effect means that nothing is likely to happen before 2021.

PURCHASE OF THE ROMAN WALL AT MIDDLEBOROUGH

As you will probably have seen in the press, the Council has agreed to buy a stretch of the Roman Wall at Middleborough from advertising firm JCDecaux with funding from several local heritage organisations including The Friends who have very generously offered £1,500.

As there has been some confusion over what is being sold, I would like to clarify that JCDecaux's ownership straddles the Roman Wall like a ribbon with land at its base, within the Wall itself and at the top. This is a potentially a unique situation as I am unaware of any other stretch of the Roman Wall in private ownership.

I can confirm on behalf of the Council that the Friends's donation is a one-off payment and neither yourselves nor any of the other funders would be liable for any ongoing costs or other responsibilities.

It is expected that the purchase of the land from JCDecaux will be completed very shortly.

FRIENDS OF COLCHESTER ROMAN WALL

After ten years, the Friends of Colchester Roman Wall (FOCRW) have completed their task of interpreting the Roman Wall and raising its profile amongst visitors and residents. Fourteen interpretation panels have now been erected around the course of the wall, paid for by FOCRW members and commercial and other sponsors. All costs relating to this work have now been met and there remains a balance of £5,120.02 in the FOCRW accounts.

At the final FOCRW committee meeting held at Colchester Castle on 11th August it was agreed that these remaining funds should be given to the Friends of Colchester Museums according to the following resolution:

'The money in the Friends's bank account is passed to the Friends of Colchester Museums on the understanding that it is applied to the repair and replacement of the Interpretation Boards erected by the Friends around the Colchester Roman Wall'

I would like to be clear that this transfer of funds will not place any additional responsibilities on the Friends of Colchester Museums beyond that of maintaining its financial resources openly and accountably. Responsibility for the cleaning and maintenance, and, when necessary, repair and replacement of the interpretation panels lies with Colchester Borough Council and more particularly Colchester and Ipswich Museums.

The funds concerned are to be held by the Friends of Colchester Museums on behalf of the Museum Service against such a time when repairs and replacement of several of the interpretation panels are required.

The interpretation panels come with a tenyear guarantee against fading and, to date, there has only been an issue with the Balkerne Gate panel which is in full sun. Likewise there has only been one serious case of vandalism, again at Balkerne Gate, where the panel was damaged beyond repair. Therefore in the short term I do not anticipate having to draw upon these funds, but looking ahead it is very helpful to know that the Museum Service has a dedicated sum of money for the interpretation panels readily available.

"A TURNER AT THE CASTLE"

JMW Turner's 'Walton Bridges' (oil on canvas, 1806) will go on public display on 26th September 2020 at Colchester Castle. This masterpiece was in danger of leaving the country, following its sale to a foreign buyer, but a rescue bid involving Norfolk Museums Service and Colchester and Ipswich Museums has led to this nationally important work being saved for the East of England and the nation. The Friends' support was key to the success of this project and your generous funding of £5,000 has ensured the painting is coming to Colchester as part of a regional tour. As well as Colchester Castle – the first venue – the painting will also be shown at Kings Lynn, Great Yarmouth and, in 2022, Christchurch Mansion in Ipswich.

As well as this presence of this wonderful painting at the Castle there will also be a supporting programme of events and activities. These include work with primary school age children and community events, both of which are now programmed for early 2021 as a result of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic.

'Walton Bridges' is planned to be on display at Colchester Castle until 29 March 2021.

AXIELL COLLECTIONS

At the end of 2019, Colchester Museums finished migrating from our old database to a new system called Axiell Collections. This new system is vastly superior, housing databases not only for our object records but also for exhibitions, loans, conservation and just in general looks a lot nicer and is far easier for users.

We use the system as a central repository for what we know about our collections, from their object name to who donated them and what their current location is. It is a critical tool for us so it is important that people can use it well and that the system is good.

We migrated over 200,000 object records (c. 127,000+ from Colchester alone) and some 60,000 images. We have plenty more images to be migrated, but we're getting there. There's a lot of data to go through — we only moved data from one system to another, it hasn't magically fixed all the issues unfortunately — but it's an exciting challenge.

In our old system, misspellings happened regularly and could go unchecked. While tidying the 'Production Period' field, we found that our imported records had 91 varieties of the term "Roman"! A real mess if you just wanted to search for all Roman items without having to run 91 different searches. Every improvement helps our colleagues navigate the system and find records easier

The longer-term benefit of this is that we are working towards creating our online collections platform. This will mean our audiences can explore our collections from anywhere in the world! We're only at the early stages of this work but we're really excited about opening up our collections for all to see. If we're opening our records to many more people though, we of course want to make sure they look as good as possible and the records make sense. So that's where our attention will be in coming months.

TWINKLE, TWINKLE

In January 1796, two young teenage girls moved, with their family, into a house in Angel Lane Colchester. The eldest girl said of their new home —

"It was nearly in the centre of town, in a street which, though narrow and disagreeable at one end, became wider, and owned several excellent houses at the other end."

The girls were the Taylor sisters, Ann (14) and Jane (13), and the house still stands, in the street that we know today as West Stockwell Street. The girls were both exceptionally creative and loved to write. They both kept diaries and an extract from Ann's shortly after they moved in concerned the family's pet cat Beauty.

"Beauty became unwell a few weeks after our arrival that it was deemed best to consign her to a watery grave. She was taken down two or three lanes to the river and a brick tied around her neck and thrown into the stream. The next morning however, she appeared at our back door in excellent health, probably the earliest water cure on record."

Their father, Isaac Taylor was an engraver and his connections with the book trade helped Ann and Jane to get much of their work, prose and poetry published. One of their first collaborations, published in early 1804, was "Original Poems for Infant Minds" that contained 20 poems by Ann and 20 by Jane. A commission for another volume came in November 1804, to which Ann contributed 29 poems and Jane 23. Three books later in 1806 a poem by Jane was included in a book called "Rhymes for the Nursery" and that poem was "The Star" better known to us as "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star". At some point it was set to the music of an existing French folk tune and since then has become known the world over. Both the sisters were quite modest and never capitalised on their fame. But that verse written in an attic bedroom in West Stockwell Street has travelled from there to all around the world.

To give Ann, Jane and Colchester the recognition they deserve Colchester High Steward Sir Bob Russell has commissioned a life size statue of the girls to stand in an, as yet undisclosed location.

The sculptor is local artist Mandy Pratt and the models are two friends from New Town, Colchester Sixth Form students, Rosie Burnside-Fitch (Jane) and Emma Pugh (Ann). Sir Bob does not want to use any taxpayers' money for the project preferring to raise money from donations and sponsorship and both he and Mandy Pratt will be donating the intellectual copyright to the Mayor of Colchester with any proceeds from future marketing to be distributed to good causes for children within the borough.

Sir Bob has been raising money for the statue through his Heritage Tours and giving talks for a donation to the fund. He is currently offering three walking tours each lasting about 2 hours for a donation of £5 per person.

IMPACT OF CORONAVIRUS ON COLCHESTER MUSEUMS

Coronavirus has impacted what was proving to be a very successful year for Colchester & Ipswich Museum Service. By the end of February 2020, visitor numbers were up 24% on the previous year across CIMS and income was also slightly above an ambitious target. With social distancing in place for the foreseeable future, visitor number and income targets will necessarily be significantly lower than previous years to ensure the safety of staff and visitors.

ACTIVITY DURING LOCKDOWN

In response to the nationwide lockdown, CIMS commissioned activity packs in each town with contributions (in terms of content) from local cultural partners including Firstsite, Colchester Arts Centre, The Mercury Theatre, Signals, Colchester United and Colchester Zoo. Community 360, Colchester United and Royal Opera House bridge also offered to help distribute the packs to families.

CIMS have provided a webpage with home activities and have asked local people to share their experiences of lockdown. Initially

captured through social media, it is hoped some of the things people have been making or recording during lockdown will enter the museum collections.

COLCHESTER MUSEUMS DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION

Colchester Museums have begun the implementation of a charitable trust, a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO). "CMDF" has been designed to support fund-raising opportunities that are currently unavailable to CIMS, and is a separate body, an adjunct to service. It's aims and purposes are;

- The advancement of education for the public benefit particularly in the subjects of the arts, archaeology, history and science; and;
- 2. Promoting and developing Colchester Castle, Hollytrees Museum, the Natural History Museum and their collections and storage facilities, as well as supporting partner organisations to deliver related projects and activities.

Recruitment of trustees has taken some time, and we have been mindful of the importance to encourage applicants from a diverse range of personal and professional backgrounds.

SCHOOLS

Colchester Museums were already developing refreshed schools offers for Hollytrees Museum, and also examining the slight drop in school numbers to the Castle, when the lockdown begun. In response to what is likely to be much reduced numbers of schools visiting from September we have secured funding to produce a digital substitute Roman educational visit to the Castle. A 360 degree film of the Castle and Roman Temple, along with a more traditional straight to camera narrated tour, complemented by a loans box that demonstrates physical evidence to support the story, will we hope reach schools unable

to travel to us whilst the pandemic remains a threat, and those children educated from home. Longer term we hope we will reach out much further geographically using this new resource

VOLUNTEERS

2019/20 was a record breaking year for CIMS with regards to volunteer engagement. Approximately 150 different people contributed 7529 recorded hours, which is approximately 19% higher than 2018/19. As well as ongoing conservation, documentation and evaluation activities, the introduction of roles supporting 'Adorn' and 'Made In Suffolk' were key factors behind this increase. The service has endeavoured to retain those individuals and find new tasks for them to undertake. Looking ahead, CIMS staff hope to create new "help from home" volunteer roles to enable continued volunteer engagement whilst coronavirus prevents volunteering in the museum venues.
