2007 LECTURE PROGRAMME

JIM ROBINSON concluded the 2007 programme with a well researched and well presented lecture *From Black Holes to Colchester's Glasshouse* on 20th November, which was readily appreciated by yet another 100 people attending. Birthday celebrations precluded my attending the 6th November offering by JOHN RIX entitled 50 Years of Farming in the Stour Valley. By all accounts another appreciative audience of over 100 was suitably entertained.

The programme was commenced way back on 11th September when JOHN JOWERS gave a delightful lecture entitled *Fishing: A Very Essex Industry* and his knowledge of the subject shone through. For me personally, the next lecture on 23rd September by WILLIAM TYLER *Bound and Free: The End of Slavery and The Slave Trade* was both alarming yet overly political. Yes, slavery in all its respects was absolutely dreadful and exceedingly callous and cruel, but so were many other things in those days, and can we be really certain that somewhere in the world slavery in some form or another does not take place today?

PETER MURPHY'S topic on 9th October *The Archaelogy Beneath the North Sea* was of a much lighter nature and was followed a fortnight later by LEIGH ALSTON'S *Medieval Discoveries at Charlie Brown's* – an absolutely fascinating account of what happened to buildings that we all know and love, situated just outside the town centre.

It was a great programme of lectures on a wide variety of subjects, well delivered and well attended by appreciative audiences. The organisers deserve our thanks!


on display here than anywhere else in the world, and we have arranged for the Friends to enjoy a private viewing of the exhibits.

'Life Beyond the Label' opened to the public at Colchester Castle Museum on 16th October with a guest appearance by gold medal winning Paralympian swimmer, DANNY CRATES.


This ground-breaking exhibition focuses on the lives of disabled people in Colchester. The objects, stories, film and artwork reveal individual experiences alongside current and historical attitudes towards disability. The exhibition is part of a larger project on disability representation co-ordinated by the Research Centre for Museums and Galleries at Leicester University. Colchester is one of nine museums involved.

Other partners include Birmingham and Glasgow museum services and the Imperial War Museum. The exhibition will be on display until 19 May 2008.

COLCHESTER'S ROMAN CIRCUS

Colchester's Roman Circus has just received Scheduled Ancient Monument status from the Department for Culture, Media and Sport. This means the remains of the Circus are not only recognised as being of national importance but are also given legal protection from damage and development.

Design entries to create a new heritage attraction based around the Roman Circus have also just been received by Colchester Borough Council. Three firms have submitted entries which will now be the subject of a range of consultation before a decision is made early in the New Year. The selected firm will then be commissioned to work up a more detailed proposal to form part of a bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund which will be submitted later in 2008.

Discovered in late 2004, during archaeological excavations within the

Colchester Garrison, the Roman Circus, or chariot-racing track, is a unique archaeological monument in Britain. At the time of the discovery it hit the headlines across the country and was heralded as one of the most exciting Roman finds in decades. Colchester is one of only six locations in northwest Europe where a Roman circus has been securely identified.

The Council has asked design firms to come up with a concept for a cover building to enable a section of the foundations of the Circus grandstand to be exposed to public view. In addition entrants to the competition were asked to present their ideas for a wider scheme to present information about the Circus to visitors to the site. The three firms who entered the competition are: Inkpen Downie, a Colchester practice who have worked at the Visitor Information Centre, Chris Hudson Design of London, who designed the exhibitions in the Sutton Hoo Visitor Centre and Headland Design Associates, who are based in Chester and have worked for English Heritage and the National Trust.

The Museum Service has been working very hard for some time to bring forward the Council's plans for the Circus. Colchester Borough Council is fully committed to realising the potential offered by this remarkable archaeological discovery; very soon after the site was first recognised the Council committed £100,000 in order to develop a £1 million interpretation scheme. The scheduling of the Circus is great news and something that the Museum has been working towards for sometime.

The Council's Management Plan for the Roman Circus, prepared in 2006, was approved by English Heritage and adopted as a key document in the preparation of the Scheduling proposals. The Museum has worked with English Heritage in making sure that we achieve the best possible outcome for the Circus remains in the future development of the surrounding area.
