'Guardians to the King' Exhibition Comes to an End

The 'Guardians to the King' exhibition came to a close on Sunday 2nd November after three and a half exciting months.

The exhibition featured 43 miniature terracotta figures from China that dated to over 2,000 years old. These figures had never been to the UK before and their visit certainly was a coup for Colchester and indeed the region.

Visitors came from far and wide to enjoy the exhibition and the castle boasted visits from London, Wales, Bedfordshire, Birmingham and Hertfordshire to name a few. Throughout the exhibition 54,879 visitors came to the Castle to see the figures – an increase of 21,043 visitors when compared to the same period last year!

Just like the arrival of the figures, their journey back to Jiangsu province in China was under the watchful eye of a team of staff from both the Museum Service and Xuzhou Museum. The team of three staff from Xuzhou Museum arrived in the UK on 31st October and spent 6 days enjoying local sites as well, of course, as carefully taking the exhibition down and getting the figures ready for their long journey back. During their short stay in Colchester the guests enjoyed day trips to London and Cambridge, as well as some good shopping in Colchester town centre.

Round 1 of Roman Circus Heritage Lottery Fund Bid Submitted

The Round 1 submission of the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) Bid for the Roman Circus Interpretation Project was submitted on Tuesday 2nd December 2008. The submission was hand delivered by Philip Wise, Heritage Manager for Colchester and Ipswich Museum

Service, to Adrian Pritchard, Chief Executive of Colchester Borough Council, who signed the submission.

Discovered in 2004, during archaeological excavations within the Colchester Garrison, the Roman Circus, or chariot-racing track, is a unique archaeological monument in Britain. At the time of the discovery it hit the headlines across the country and was heralded as one of the most exciting Roman finds in decades. Colchester is one of only six locations in northwest Europe where a Roman circus has been securely identified. The Roman Circus in Colchester has Scheduled Ancient Monument status.

The Roman Circus Interpretation Project seeks to interpret and conserve the site with a cover building, offering both residents of Colchester and tourists a new attraction to enjoy in the town. The project will raise the public's awareness of Colchester's rich heritage and provide a focus and resource for educational activities. The Round 1 submission seeks external to council funding of £950,000,

and in March 2009 it will be announced if the submission has been a success, after which a Round 2 submission will be prepared.

All Change for Climate Change!

It's all change at the Natural History Museum as natural history and display staff work on the new Geology and Climate Change Exhibition which opens on the 7th April 2009.

Occupying the eastern end of the museum, this will be a permanent redisplay using grant money from The Wolfson Foundation. Modern new cases will replace those dating from the sixties and will give us a chance to show more of the fascinating fossils and other material currently in store.

As well as exploring the evidence for past geological periods and climates, there will be sections on the earthquake of 1884, the Great Tide of 1953 and the 'hurricane' of 1987.

The last part of the exhibition deals with present day climate change and how we can halt or slow it down, as well as predicting what might happen if we do nothing!

We will be taking our usual multi-sensory, interactive approach, but still leaving room for what museums do best: plenty of real specimens!

Colchester Castle Receives Sandford Award for Education

The Education team at Colchester and Ipswich Museum Service were delighted recently when Colchester Castle Museum was given a Sandford Award for Heritage Education 2008. The award was given to the museum in recognition of the quality education packages offered and delivered at the Castle.

In November Caroline Hammer, Senior Learning Officer and Lynette Burgess, Learning and Marketing Manager, attended the presentation ceremony at Hampton Court where the Duke of Buccleuch presented the prestigious award.

Submissions for Sandford Awards are assessed by a panel of independent judges. The current panel of judges is drawn from professional educationalists including OFSTED Inspectors, former head teachers, education consultants and heritage property based education officers.

The judge's final report of the education services at Colchester Castle stated:

"In Colchester Castle Museum, the sessions offered take advantage of the best that the site has to offer and the result is a highly desirable service with many repeat visits and a full timetable. In the museum displays, local objects of national significance help to reinforce

for the children that their local historic site and museum have real national significance. The service to schools supports and enhances work done in school. The activities support classroom learning and they successfully achieve the aim of providing an approach which could not be used in the classroom."

17 In Print Exhibition Opens

On Saturday 29th November a brand new exhibition opened at Colchester Castle Museum. 17 in Print proudly showcases prints from 17 different artists associated with the eastern region. Spanning more than 80 years the prints cover a rich diversity of themes and include etchings, engravings, wood cuts and lino cuts.

The 17 artists celebrated in the exhibition have all been drawn to the beauty of the eastern region and the exhibition includes prints by the world famous Eduardo Paolozzi who was a visiting lecturer at Colchester Art School. Additionally the exhibition includes pieces by Barry Woodcock, who trained at Ipswich Art School, Blair Hughes Stanton, illustrator for D H Lawrence, and Valerie Thornton whose work includes an engraving of the Roman pots in Colchester Castle.

This unique collection of prints has been gathered over the past 12 years by the Museum Service and looks at a rich diversity of themes including landscapes, maritime, nature and animals, storytelling and mythology and the

abstract. Many of the works have never been seen in public in the museums before, so don't miss out on this beautiful celebration of regional art which can be enjoyed free as part of the Colchester Castle experience.

Empire of Care – New Exhibition in Hollytrees Museum, Colchester until March 1st 2009

The National Health Service celebrates its 60th Anniversary this year and Hollytrees Museum will be hosting an exhibition about the lives and stories of the nurses who came to Colchester to work for the NHS, recruited from other countries throughout the Commonwealth Empire.

Following the Second World War there was a huge shortage of medical staff in the UK and the NHS began actively recruiting from Europe, Africa, West Indies, Malaysia and China. Colchester's hospitals became a centre for new nurses from overseas with some of them choosing to settle in Colchester and the surrounding area.

This fascinating exhibition displays objects, stories, photographs and press cuttings to bring the story of Colchester's overseas nurses to life. Insightful interviews capture the pioneering spirit of these trainee nurses; their journeys, experiences, the uniforms and the friends they met along the way.

This exhibition can be enjoyed free of charge in the beautiful surroundings of Hollytrees Museum.

For Valour

On 7th November Colchester Borough Council unveiled Blue Plaques to two soldiers from Colchester who were awarded the Victoria Cross. The museum service has marked this event with the small exhibition, For Valour, in Colchester Castle Museum.

The Victoria Cross is the most important of all British medals and decorations. It was

introduced by Queen Victoria in 1856 for exceptional bravery in battle.

The exhibition, which runs from 7th November 2008 to 8th February 2009 features the original Victoria Cross and other medals won by Colonel James Colvin. We only have a replica of the VC awarded to Colour Sergeant Edmund Fowler – you'll have to go to the Cameronians' Museum in Hamilton, Scotland to see the real thing!

Both soldiers served in the heyday of the British Empire when the army was called on to fight many campaigns, large and small, to maintain and expand the imperial realm.

Colour Sergeant Edmund Fowler was born in Ireland and joined the Perthshire Light Infantry, later merged with the Cameronians. He won his Victoria Cross, when still at the rank of Private, in 1879 during the Zulu War in South Africa. He and two others charged into a cave, under fire at point blank range, to clear it of Zulu defenders. This event was described by Sir Evelyn Wood, himself a VC winner, as the bravest action he had seen. Fowler retired from the army and moved to Colchester where he became landlord of the Cups Hotel Tap. When he died in 1926 he was buried with full military honours at Colchester Cemetery.

Colonel James Colvin was born in India where his father worked for the Bengal Civil Service. He joined the Royal Engineers and was awarded his VC for action in 1897 on the North West Frontier of what is now Pakistan. With echoes of the present day fighting against the Taliban, a British force which had been on a mission to destroy enemy positions was itself attacked. The soldiers were pinned down and, over the course of many hours into the night, Lieutenant Colvin led a series of counter-attacks to try and relieve their position before another British column arrived. Colvin married Katherine Way of Spaynes Hall, near Great Yeldham Essex in 1904 and, after serving

with the army in India, retired to Catchbells in Stanway where he died in 1945.

New Assistant Curator of Community History - Cat Newley

Despite previously never having been to Colchester, I'd heard lots about it, and particularly about the work that Colchester and Ipswich Museums were doing. I'm originally from the South West, but I've lived in Birmingham, Leicester and Cardiff, so I've done a fair bit of moving around! After spending some time volunteering in several museums in Bristol I decided that museums were where I wanted to be and I went back to university last year to complete a Masters degree in Museum Studies. It was towards the end of this course that I saw the advert for an Assistant Curator. here in Colchester. I applied and I was lucky enough to get the job. I've been here for 3 months now and I've found it really easy to settle in. The people are welcoming, the town and its buildings are beautiful, and it rains a lot less here! I'm finding the job very rewarding too. I enjoy getting to spend lots of time with the collections and talking to people about their memories. Right now, I'm working on developing a 'lending library' collection of museum handling objects for reminiscence work, which I hope will lead me to find out even more about Colchester and its residents
