FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Friends of Colchester Museums who regularly attend our fortnightly lectures will know how popular they have been in 2014. In fact, the average attendance for the twelve talks has been as high as 133, which is probably a record. The programme for 2015 is now published herein and the Committee has decided to offer members a season ticket at a slightly reduced rate, which should help speed up entry at the door, as well as providing a modest saving.

In addition to our well attended Open Evening at the Castle Museum last June, many Friends have visited on the their own account as a benefit of membership. Despite the great success of the refurbished Castle and its new displays, though, with visitor figures exceeding expectations, our Museum Service remains under considerable financial constraint. Another structural review is currently in progress.

As is now well known, Colchester Borough Council has put greater emphasis on the need to generate revenue income, in which context the Friends' admission to the Castle has been identified for consideration. I am pleased to be able to report that as a result of further discussions the Portfolio-holder, Cllr. Tim Young, has agreed to a solution which will enable the Friends to continue visiting the Castle Museum as often as they wish without having to make any extra payment. This will be achieved by the society making an agreed annual contribution per member (currently (4.75), which 'in toto' will effectively purchase annual group entry for members at a special concessionary rate. The amount payable per member will be reviewed annually at the end of October.

This solution will guarantee CBC a substantial revenue contribution which could not be achieved in any other way: there is the

added advantage that VAT will not be payable. In choosing it the Council has indicated how it prefers the Friends to give their financial support to the Museum Service under current circumstances. There is, of course, the possible implication that the total amount of income available for acquisitions and new projects will be proportionately reduced, although the Friends still retain flexibility in how they wish to raise funds to support Colchester's museums.

The Committee is currently looking at potential new activities for our members and if you feel that you can help, particularly with social activities, I would be very pleased to hear from you.

When speaking to your bank, please be sure to say that you are asking about a Standing Order and <u>not</u> a direct debit. Direct debits are automated and organisations like ours cannot operate them. If you have any problems, please let me know.

Your annual Membership Card is also enclosed - please forward payment of your subscription to me.

As well as increasing Annual Subscriptions, we are also increasing the admission for the Lectures from £1 to £2 for members and from £2 to £4 for non-members. The rent at Lion Walk has been increased but had been at a very low rate for many years and admission seems to have last been increased in 1999. The new fee is low in comparison with other groups.

However, we are introducing a season ticket scheme, which means that you can save money if you are intending to attend most of the lectures. Please send £20 for a ticket giving admission to all 12 lectures and please enclose a stamped addressed envelope. Many thanks.

We depart Otley Hall at approximately 9.30pm for our return to Colchester.



Bletchley Park is a world-class heritage site telling the incredible story of the World War II Code Breakers and how their dedication and ingenuity helped shorten the war by two years. You can visit the Code Breaking Huts and follow the intelligence production line approach to code breaking and see a range of galleries and displays about wartime Bletchley Park, including the Enigma collection, the Lorenz Gallery, Hitler's 'unbreakable' cipher machine and the fully operational 'Bombe Rebuild' which was an electro-mechanical machine that helped break coded messages from Y stations

There is a gift shop and coffee shop and a range of hot and cold food can be had in Hut 4 (formerly WWII Naval Intelligence Code-breaking Hut). Multimedia guides are available and there will be an opportunity to join one of the hour long outdoor walking guided tours available on the day, at no extra cost. 
COLCHESTER CASTLE

By the time you are reading this article, the Castle redevelopment project will be officially finished and the Heritage Lottery Fund will have received the final project report as a Christmas present (the report will be too big to put inside a cracker). As well as the HLF, The Friends and Colchester Borough Council, the £4.2m redevelopment has also been financially supported by the European Regional Development Fund, the Arts Council, Essex Heritage Trust and the Friends of Colchester's Roman Wall.


After six months of being open again we have welcomed 71,000 visitors to the Castle of whom nine and a half thousand have been schoolchildren. 3,000 people visited on our Heritage Open Day in September and we are expecting a similar number for Christmas at the Castle on 10th December. We are certainly on course to exceed our target of 100,000 visitors by the end of March.

There has been an overwhelmingly positive response to the new displays, the increased use of digital interpretation and the light projection on the main internal wall. Many people have also commented on the fact that they can now see more of the Castle structure itself which is very gratifying as that has been one of the main intentions of the new design.

In September the much-awaited model of the Castle was delivered. It now stands in the centre of the ground floor. The model shows

The model opened up

how the Castle probably appeared in 1157 at the time of the visit by Henry II and Thomas Becket. There are cutaways in the walls and the whole north wall can be opened out and the Roman foundations revealed. The model is the starting point for school visits and will serve the same purpose for blind and visually impaired visitors who use the audio descriptive tour which has now been written and recorded by ATS Heritage.

Peel Heritage have continued to add new features to the digital tablet, including an animation of the figures on the Colchester Vase. 5,000 people have already hired the digital tablet to enhance their visit.

The exterior of the Castle has not been ignored in the new development and a suite of six panels can be found in the Castle Park on the south, east and north sides of the Castle. Further interpretive panels to interpret the town's wider heritage will appear from November to augment those that already stand at Balkerne Gate and Duncan's Gate. Peel Heritage are also producing a further App that can be downloaded onto people's mobile devices so that they can take a self guided tour of Colchester's main Roman and Medieval sites

CASTLE WINS AWARD

On 22nd October the Castle won the Main Attraction category at the Essex Tourism and Hospitality Awards. The awards evening was organised by the *Essex Chronicle* in

association with Visit Essex. The Castle now goes on to compete for a Visit England sponsored national award.

MANAGING COLCHESTER'S HERITAGE

Following a pilot phase last year, further heritage panels have been commissioned for six sites in the borough as part of the Colchester Castle and Wider Heritage HLFund project. The sites are: St John's Abbey, St Botolph's Priory, Lexden Mount, Gosbecks Archaeological Park, Holy Trinity Church and Gryme's Dyke. It is hoped that these and a further panel at East Gate should all be in place for the start of the 2015 tourist season.

The Museum Service is also continuing to work in partnership with the Friends of Colchester's Roman Wall on a wall walk and a further ten panels are in preparation to accompany the three already installed or commissioned.

The long standing Local Management

Agreement with English Heritage remains in place and a particular focus at present is improving access at St John's Abbey Gatehouse where a metal handrail will be installed shortly. Also at the Gatehouse, the Museum Service continues to support the Colchester Catholic Heritage Group who have taken a particular interest in this historic site.

Repair work at Mersea Barrow, funded by English Heritage and coordinated by the Museum Service, has seen electric light installed inside the entrance passage of this Roman burial mound and close working continues with Mersea Island Museum who organise regular guided tours of the site. In July 2014 the finds from Mersea Barrow were lent to Mersea Island Museum and are now on display, thereby increasing public access to an important part of the island's heritage.

Heritage Open Days in September 2014, coordinated in Colchester by the Museum Service, saw a record number of visitors to the borough's heritage attractions, many of which are not regularly open. The total number was

13,261 for the thirty sites and events, including Peake's House in East Stockwell Street, Mersea Barrow, Audley Chapel and a guided walk around the Town Wall.

NEW ACQUISITION: LATE BRONZE AGE HOARD FROM BURNHAM ON CROUCH, ESSEX.

This remarkable hoard of ancient metalwork includes 214 pieces of bronze plus sherds from a pottery vessel; in total some eight boxes of finds. It dates to 1200BC - 700BC and was found on farmland near Burnham on Crouch by four metal detectorists during August and September 2010.

The hoard's discovery was reported to Laura McLean, the then Essex Finds Liaison Officer, and she organised an archaeological excavation to recover any items remaining in the ground. The excavation in October 2010 was carried out by Laura McLean, a freelance archaeologist Kate Orr (now Clover) and three members of staff from the British Museum with the assistance of the four finders. It



included the lifting of a soil block containing a damaged pottery vessel and further metalwork. Examination of the pottery vessel and the removal of its contents were carried out in the Museum Service's conservation laboratory in Colchester.

The hoard includes socketed axes, spearheads, knives, gouges, sickles, swords and horse harness fittings as well as ingots and pieces of casting waste. As it contains both actual objects and raw materials it is likely that this hoard was buried by a bronzesmith rather than as a religious offering, although we may never know for certain. This is undoubtedly the largest hoard of Bronze Age metalwork to have entered the Colchester Museum collection in the last fifteen years.
