ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS

During Lockdown, the Friends of Colchester Museums has continued to help Colchester Museums.

We have contributed towards the purchase of a section of the Roman Wall and also to the cost of the exhibition of the Turner painting "Walton Bridges". We have had administrative expenses, such as insurance for all our operations, not just the talks and events. We posted newsletters to members who could not receive them electronically so there have been postage,

administrative and printing expenses. In any case, our basic purpose is fund raising for the Museum to buy exhibits and help with their expenses.

As you will see, we are arranging for lectures to be given by Zoom and will not be charging for them. If you are able to give a donation instead of the admission fee, usually $\pounds 2$, please add a nominal sum to your subscription or make a separate payment by cheque or through the bank.

I am sure that members will realise the need for subscriptions and the usual Subscription Form is enclosed. About a third of all subscriptions are paid through the bank, either by a standing order or individual transfers. For those of you who wish to pay that way, please see the bank account details on the subscription form, so that you can either set up a standing order or make a one off payment for your subscription. Please make sure that your name is shown as a reference.

Your membership card for 2021 is enclosed for use when visiting the Castle. If you decide that you do not wish to renew please return the card to our membership secretary. We are still holding payments for the trips that we originally arranged for 2020 and will not take place in 2021. If you now require a refund please let me know.

ANOTHER ASSET LOST?

You may have seen in the papers recently that an exhibition of 200 years of Colchester Engineering currently located in the Museum of Rural Life in Stowmarket has been served notice.



The Colchester Engineering Society initiated the display as a Millennium project with our own Andrew Phillips having a considerable input. The exhibition occupies over 1,200 square feet and includes many products from local firms. Some are quite large such as a full size cross section of an 18 cylinder Deltic diesel engine.

What to do with it? That is the question. With Paxman having a large presence in the display, coupled with the impending factory closure, it would seem only right that it should return to Colchester. But where to put it? The Castle Museum does not have the space nor the money to do anything. There was speculation that a building in the Paxman factory

might be set aside. That will depend on what the company want to do with the site but with the site over a mile from the town centre it is a bit off the tourist trail.

The future of the exhibition does not look promising. Will this be another lost chance to capitalise on Colchester's heritage? Another asset lost like the clock museum and the local history museum?

A couple of years ago there were moves to try to acquire an army building from the barracks to establish a military museum that came to nothing and Jumbo and the old Odeon cinema stand derelict. I seem to remember that the unique Roman Circus had a lot of problems establishing itself as an attraction and why do the signs from the High Street disappear when you emerge from the Westway underpass?

I just wish that Colchester could make the most of its past in the way that Chester and York do. Meanwhile, we do have the unloved and underused Firstsite that would, even in the short term, make an ideal place for a Colchester engineering exhibition.

HERITAGE MANAGER'S REPORT

BUTT ROAD ROMAN CHURCH

Over the last few months, significant progress has been made in the presentation of this important archaeological site located next to Colchester's Police Station on Southway, and thought by some to be the remains of the earliest Christian church in Britain constructed around AD 320. Repairs to the masonry and renewal of the timber posts and gravelled surface, largely funded by Colchester Borough Council, were undertaken in July by specialist building contractors. A new interpretation panel is currently in preparation and is planned to be installed early in 2021.



The site was excavated by the Colchester Archaeological Trust in the 1980s and is usually interpreted as a Christian church on the basis of its plan, the presence of possible graves inside the building and a nearby late Roman Christian cemetery. Recently an alternative theory that the building was a mithraeum, or temple to the eastern

god Mithras, has been proposed on the grounds that its size, lack of windows and the evidence of feasting fit better with its use by followers of this religion.

The announcement by Historic England that the site had been recognised as being of national importance and designated as a Scheduled Ancient Monument, following an application by Colchester Borough Council, attracted considered press interest, including a report in 'The Times' on 14th October.

ST BOTOLPH'S CHURCHYARD

A project to interpret the historic churchyard at St Botolph's Priory will see the installation early in 2021 of a new interpretation panel commemorating three remarkable individuals buried here: Captain Jesse Jones, Dr Roger Nunn and William Hawkins MP.

Jones fought in the Peninsular War of 1807-14, in which an allied army under the command of Sir Arthur Wellesley (later the Duke of Wellington) drove the French out of Spain. He was wounded at the Battle of Waterloo in 1815 but lived to tell the tale and retired to Colchester. Dr Nunn was the first doctor to work at what became the Essex County Hospital when it opened in Lexden

Road in 1820. He was also Mayor of Colchester in 1834 and again in 1842/3. William Hawkins was a leading figure in the attempt to develop Colchester as a major port on the East Coast in the mid-19th century. He built two railways to improve the links to the port at the Hythe, one to Sudbury and the other to Clacton.

Conservation work will also be undertaken on the grave of Captain Jones as part of this project which is being undertaken by the Museum Service in collaboration with the Colchester Civic Society.

LEXDEN MOUNT

This impressive Roman burial mound is located in a private garden in Lexden, but is visible from an area of public open space. As part of an agreement with Historic England an interpretation panel was erected by the Museum Service at the site a few years ago and funding was made available for regular grounds maintenance. This work, involving the clearance of invasive vegetation and the removal of some dead trees, has recently been undertaken by specialist contractors commissioned by Colchester Borough Council. As a result of this work Lexden Mount should not require any further maintenance for several vears.

INTERPRETATION AUDIT OF ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITES AND HISTORIC BUILDINGS

Over the last six months Lois Garrod Smith, the Arts and Heritage Project Officer within the Museum's Heritage team, worked on an interpretation audit of the archaeological sites and historic buildings within Colchester. The purpose was to review the current state of interpretation at these locations and prioritise work so that as and when funding becomes available work can be undertaken as rapidly as possible. The sites considered included the Roman Circus, Hilly Fields, Lexden Park, Berechurch Hall Dyke, Holy Trinity Church, St Giles's Church and St Michael and All Angels, Mile End. We now have a very detailed understanding of these sites, all of which were visited by the Heritage Manager during the course of the project.
